Significant Deficiencies
During a sanitary survey conducted on 12/31/2012, the Mississippi State Department of Health cited the following significant deficiency(s):
Inadequate internal cleaning/maintenance of storage tanks.

Corrective actions: This system has entered into a Bilateral Compliance Agreement with MSDH to correct this deficiency by 8/07/2014.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated

with service lines and home plumbing. Our Water Association is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. 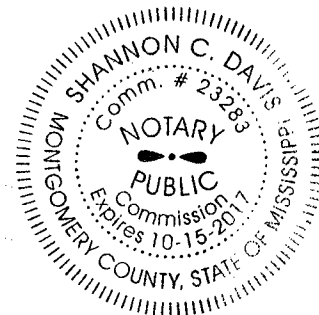
