**STABBING**

On the witness stand, when Assistant District Attorney Dennis Bisnette asked Sullivan why his memory of the incident was more clear eight months later, he said, "I just wanted to get it over with. I didn't want it to go to court. I'm supposed to move out of state this month."

Sullivan is now in a dating relationship with Fenderson's sister, several sources with knowledge of the case said, but that didn't come up in testimony.

The jury deliberated for less than 15 minutes before returning the verdict.

Bisnette said he knew the case would be difficult to prosecute with wicky-wassy witnesses.

"If the victim doesn't care, why should the jury?" he said. "We tried to go forward anyway. We're encouraged to go forward by the people with the state."

Sullivan admitted to being drunk and high on cocaine on the night of the incident, but Laurel police officer

Tyler Zugg and investigator Kim Stewart both testified that he didn't appear to be impaired when they talked to him at the hospital.

"Being stabbed will sober you up pretty quick, won't it?" Bisnette asked Zugg.

The confrontation happened at about 2 a.m. Aug. 10 when Sullivan was driving up Lindsey Avenue and had just turned onto 20th Street when they saw a group of young black men in the street. Haynes was in the passenger's seat beside him and Michael Cook was in the back seat. Sullivan and Haynes testified that they heard someone call Sullivan's name, so he stopped. When he did, they started getting punched through the open windows. Sullivan got out and began to fight with his assailant, "then I blacked out" and got back in the car, he testified. He drove a little ways then noticed the gaping wound below his left rib cage.

He drove himself to the emergency room at South Central Regional Medical Center and got out alone. Haynes then drove away from the hospital.

"I was going to get (Sullivan's) sister," Haynes testified.

Sullivan testified, "The only thing I remember is going to the hospital and

waking up after surgery." Thompson asked him directly several times if Fenderson stabbed him.

"No, sir," Sullivan answered every time. Stewart testified that Sullivan "understood fully what was going on" when he gave his sworn statement several hours after his surgery in the hospital.

But Thompson noted that Sullivan admitted to being under the influence of alcohol and cocaine, then from morphine that doctors had given him for pain.

"He appeared to be thinking clearly," Stewart testified. "If he was really high and drunk, I wouldn't have talked to him then. He was aware of what he was saying."

Thompson also asked if any weapon or bloody clothes were found. "Eight days later, you're not going to find that," Stewart said.

In his opening statement, Bisnette told jurors that he was dealing with reluctant witnesses, but prosecutors were still trying the case.

"We don't want this to happen to other people and we don't want the victim trying to extract revenge," he

said, "so the state is standing in place of the victim."

In the closing argument, Bisnette said it was up to the jury to decide why the two witnesses' statements changed. He noted that there were four consistent statements immediately after the incident and only one that Sullivan changed eight months later.

"Did Mr. Fenderson's people get to him?" he asked. "If Mr. Fenderson wasn't guilty, why didn't he walk down to the Laurel Police Department and surrender himself? No, eight days later, he was found hiding behind a refrigerator in a residence."

Thompson closed by saying that the state had failed to prove its case "beyond a reasonable doubt" and that Sullivan's statement, "while he was high on cocaine, drunk and on morphine" after major surgery shouldn't be considered credible.

The jury deliberated for 13 minutes before foreman Josh "The Guru" Nichols came back and read the "not guilty" verdict to the court.

As Fenderson walked out with Thompson, Bisnette said, "Don't let me see you back in here."

Our water source consists of two wells that draw from the Sparta Sand Aquifer.

A source water assessment has been completed for the Beaverdam Water Association's water supply to determine overall susceptibility of its drinking water to identify potential sources of contamination. The water supply, Beaverdam Water Association received a moderate susceptibility ranking to contamination.

We're pleased to report that our drinking water meets all federal and state requirements.

We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the second Tuesday of each month at the Beaverdam Water Association office at 6:30 p.m.

Beaverdam Water Association routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2014. Water travels over the land or underground, it can pick up substances or contaminants such as microbes, inorganic and organic chemicals, and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It is important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk.

In this table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we provided the following definitions:

**Action Level** - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

**Treatment Technique (TT)** - A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

**Maximum Contaminant Level** - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLG as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

**Maximum Contaminant Level Goal** - The "Goal" (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

**Additional Information for Lead**  
 If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Beaverdam Water Association is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to: before using water for drinking or cooking, flush your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes; use cold water for drinking and cooking; use only certified lead-free faucets; use bottled water. 
