We are pleased to present to you the year's Annual Quality Water Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best asset. Our water should be first with strong from our Chalchale.

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall acceptability of its drinking water supply to identify potential sources of contamination. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility assessments were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing upon request. The tests for the Chalchale Water Association have been done to approximate changes in terms of susceptibility to contamination.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Bobby Galloway at 662-790-3421. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please join us at any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the third Friday of March, June, and October at 7:00 PM at the Chalchale Water Office, Annual Meeting March.

We routinely monitor for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table below lists all of the drinking water contaminants that were detected during the period of January 15 to December 31, 2014 to comply with monitoring requirements required in 2014. This table reflects the most recent results. As water travels over the surface of land or underground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials and can pick up substances or contaminants from the presence of a spill or from natural sources. Potential contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife. Inorganic substances, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm-water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, and household uses. Organic chemicals, including herbicides and pesticides, which are by-products of industrial production and petroleum products, and can also come from gas stations and other petroleum products, household chemicals, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA continually regulates the level of certain water contaminants in water used by public water systems. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be occasionally exposed to certain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It is important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk.

In this report you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The "Maximum Allowable" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLG is a water quality goal. MCLGs do not enforce the drinking water system because they are not enforceable.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - The "Maximum Allowable" (MCL) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water based which there is a known or expected risk to health. MCLs are for a range of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that disinfection is important for controlling microbial contaminants. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDL) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Pounds per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L) - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$100,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$1,000,000.

Processed per liter (GPD) - gallons per liter is a measure of the productivity in water.

1. Chlorine residual: The sample reported for 2014. As you can see by the table, our system had the violations. We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements. We have tested through our monitoring and testing that some violations have been detected however the EPA has determined that your water IS SAFE at these levels.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. In an effort to ensure systems, complete all monitoring requirements. AllSDH now makes systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The water system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. Violations have been detected in several homes. You can minimize the lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested.
