



# 2014-2015 Influenza Report Week 20

May 17, 2015 – May 23, 2015

**Note: This is the final influenza surveillance report for the 2014-2015 season.**


## About our flu activity reporting

MSDH relies upon selected sentinel health practitioners across the state to report the percentage of total patient visits consistent with an influenza-like illness (ILI: fever of 100°F or higher AND cough and/or sore throat). Also, providers are supplied with specimen collection kits. Samples are submitted to the Mississippi Public Health Laboratory for influenza PCR testing. Reports are used to estimate the state's ILI rate and the magnitude of the state's influenza activity. Reports represent only the distribution of flu in the state, not an actual count of all flu cases statewide. **Information is provisional only and may change depending on additional reporting from sentinel providers.**

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State ILI Surveillance




During week **20** (05/17/15-05/23/15), the overall state ILI rate (**2.0%**) was **comparable** to the previous week (**2.3%**) and to this time last year (**2.2%**).



During week **20**, **one** district (2) had an increase in ILI activity, while **five** districts (1, 3, 6, 7, and 8) had a decrease. **Three** districts (4, 5, and 9) remained about the same. *Information is provisional only and may change depending on additional reporting from sentinel providers.* | **Table 2**






Since week 35, the overall percentage of reported ILI cases has been highest among those in the 5-24 years of age group. This trend

Mississippi ILI Rates 2011-2015 | [Figure 4](#)




**Flu Testing Reports**

From week **40** (week ending October 4<sup>th</sup>) through week **20** (week ending May 23<sup>rd</sup>), 193 positive influenza samples were identified by MSDH. One hundred sixty-one samples (83%) were identified as influenza A (H3), eight (4%) as influenza A (H1), and twenty-four (12%) were identified as influenza B. The last positive influenza sample identified by MSDH occurred in week 12 (week ending March 28<sup>th</sup>). |




The influenza cases were identified from the following counties: Alcorn (1), Attala (4), Benton (5), Bolivar (3), Choctaw (1), Coahoma (1), Copiah (3), Covington (2), DeSoto (2), Forrest (1), Franklin (3), Harrison (14), Hinds (3), Holmes (2), Humphreys (1), Itawamba (3), Jackson (1), Jefferson (2), Jefferson Davis (1), Jones (5), Kemper (3), Lafayette (3), Lauderdale (6), Leake (2), Lee (3), Leflore (1), Lowndes (5), Madison (9), Marion (5), Marshall (10), Monroe (5), Neshoba (5), Noxubee (3), Oktibbeha (3), Pearl River (5), Pike (2), Pontotoc (1), Prentiss (5), Rankin (9), Simpson (8), Sunflower (2), Tallahatchie (3), Tate (4), Tishomingo (2), Union (1), Walthall (1), Warren (2), Washington (7), Webster (9), Wilkinson (3), and Yazoo (6). Two cases were from unidentified counties.



### National and Mississippi Pediatric Mortality Surveillance

Nationally, **two** influenza-associated pediatric deaths were reported to CDC during week **20**. Both deaths were associated with an influenza B virus and occurred during week 19 (week ending May 16<sup>th</sup>). One influenza-associated pediatric death that was reported during week 19 and occurred during the 2013-14 season was later reclassified by the reporting jurisdiction as not due to influenza. This brings the total number of reported pediatric deaths occurring during that season to 111. To date, **141** influenza-associated pediatric deaths have been reported nationally during the 2014-2015 influenza season. | [Figure 6](#)




Of the **141** influenza-associated pediatric deaths reported nationally during the 2014-2015 season, 109 (77%) have been attributed to influenza A viruses, 29 (21%) to influenza B viruses, two (1%) to an influenza A/B virus not

### National ILI Surveillance


For week **20**, the MS ILI rate (2.0%) remained **above** the national ILI rate (1.2%), but followed national trends. | [Figure 8](#)

Level of Flu Activity	Definition
<b>No Activity</b>	Overall clinical activity remains low and there are no lab confirmed cases.
<b>Sporadic</b>	Isolated cases of lab confirmed influenza in the state; ILI activity is not increased <u>OR</u> A lab-confirmed outbreak in a single institution in the state; ILI activity is not increased.
<b>Local</b>	Increased ILI within a single region <b>AND</b> recent (within the past 3 weeks) laboratory evidence of influenza in that region. ILI activity in other regions is not increased <u>OR</u> two of more institutional outbreaks (ILI or lab confirmed) within a single region <b>AND</b> recent (within the past 3 weeks) lab confirmed influenza in that region. Other regions do not have increased ILI and virus activity is no greater than sporadic in those regions
<b>Regional</b>	Increased ILI in at least 2 regions but fewer than half of the regions <b>AND</b> recent (within the past 3 weeks) lab confirmed influenza in the affected regions <u>OR</u> Institutional outbreaks (ILI or lab confirmed) in at least 2 regions but fewer than half of the regions <b>AND</b> recent lab confirmed influenza in the affected regions.
<b>Widespread</b>	Increased ILI and/or institutional outbreaks (ILI or lab confirmed) in at least half of the regions <b>AND</b> recent (within the past 3 weeks) lab confirmed influenza in the state.

During week **20**, influenza activity continued to **decrease** in the United States.<sup>1</sup> | [Figure 9](#)
















