Thousands view B.B. King on eve of funeral

INDIANOLA — Blues guitarist Buddy Guy says he always intended to tour the B.B. King Museum while its namesake, his longtime friend, was still living.

The 78-year-old Guy was among more than 4,000 people who filed past King's open casket at the museum Friday, the eve of the blues legend's funeral in the Mississippi Delta.

"His left hand was a special effect," Guy said, describing King's talent for bending strings to make the guitar sing. "These young people playing, you punch a button and you get a vibration," Guy said. "He didn't need that. He invented that."

King was 89 when he died May 14 at his home in Las Vegas. A public viewing and invitation-only memorial service were held in the city before his body was flown to Memphis, Tennessee, for a tribute Wednesday.

A funeral is set for Saturday at a Baptist church in the King's hometown of Indianola, Mississippi. He is scheduled to be buried during a private service at B.B. King Museum and Delta Interpretive Center.

King's public viewing Friday was almost like a state funeral, with Mississippi Highway Patrol officers in dress uniform standing at each end of the casket. Two of his black electric guitars — each named Lucille — stood among sprays of flowers.

Music fans Stuart and Anita Caven of Edinburg, Tenn., had already planned their vacation in the United States before King died. After visiting New Orleans, they drove to Indianola and stood among the throngs outside the museum as King's casket was rolled out to a hearse after the public viewing.

"I'll have a deep respect for what came from the blues," Stuart Caven said.

Horse park to host 4-H show today

The competition, which starts at 8:30 a.m., is free and open to the public, according to a news release from Dana Traywick, marketing and communications director for the horse park. The horse park is at 869 East Poor House Road, and the competition will be in the covered arena and indoor arena, ending in early afternoon.

Winners of Saturday's competitions in halter, Western, english, and speed trial will come back to the horse park June 10 through 13 for the 4-H Northeast District Horse Show.

That event, also free to the public, draws young competitors from 22 northeast Mississippi counties, Traywick said.

District winners will move on to the state show in Jackson, and first-place winners there will advance to 4-H Regionals, according to a news release.

Stocks end week lower following disappointing economic data

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks sank Friday following news that the U.S. economy shrank in the first three months of the year.

The revised data showed that gross domestic product contracted 0.7 percent in the first quarter. That was worse than the government's initial estimate of growth of 0.2 percent.

The Dow Jones industrial average lost 115.44 points, or 0.6 percent, to 18,010.68. The Standard & Poor's 500 index lost 13.40 points, or 0.6 percent, to 2,107.29 and the Nasdaq composite lost 27.95 points, or 0.6 percent, to 5,070.03.

All three indexes ended the week lower. It was

the first weekly loss for the S&P 500 following three weeks of gains.

Investors had two other disappointing pieces of economic news to work through. A Chicago manufacturing survey fell to 46.2, well below the 53 that economists were anticipating, and a measure of consumer sentiment fell to a six-month low in May.

Along with the disappointing economic data, investors continued to watch developments out of Greece.

Greek Prime Minister Alexis Tsipras has said a deal with the country's creditors could be ready by the weekend, but it appears other key officials are less confident.

"With it being a Friday and the uncertainty around the Greece situation and the disappointing economic data, naturally investors are taking some of their positions off the table," said JJ Kindan, a strategist at TD Ameritrade.
