

The City of Meridian is pleased to present to you this year's Annual Water Quality report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality of the water we produce and services we deliver to you everyday. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and to protect our water resources. We are committed to insuring the quality of your drinking water.

Our water source consists of eight wells pumping from the LOWER WILCOX AQUIFER. The depth of these wells range from 747' to 948'. A source water assessment has been completed by the Mississippi State Department of Health and can be reviewed in the utility billing office at 311 27th Ave.

THE CITY IS PLEASED TO REPORT THAT OUR DRINKING WATER MEETS OR EXCEEDS ALL FEDERAL AND STATE REQUIREMENTS.

The City of Meridian routinely monitors for 154 constituents or potential contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State Laws. Of these 154 constituents, we had 0 detects in 2016. The table on the back shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2016.

Fluoride. To comply with the "Regulation Governing Fluoridation of Community Water Supplies", MS0380005 is required to report certain results pertaining to fluoridation of our water system. The number of months in the previous calendar year that the average fluoride sample results were within the optimal range of 0.7—1.3 ppm was 11. The percentage of fluoride samples collected in the previous calendar year that was within the optimal range of 0.7—1.3 ppm was 87%.

Important Information Regarding Your Drinking Water:
 All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by substances that are naturally occurring or manmade. These substances can be microbes, inorganic or organic chemicals and radionuclides. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. VULNERABILITY:




