We're pleased to present to you this year's Annual Quality Water Report. This report is designed to inform you about the quality water and services we deliver to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. Our water source is from wells drawing from the Gordo Formation Aquifer.

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall susceptibility of its drinking water supply to identified potential sources of contamination. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing upon request. The wells for the Clayton Village Water Association, Inc. have received a moderate susceptibility ranking to contamination.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Willette McClain at 662.324.8260. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the second Saturday of each month at 9:00 AM at the Clayton Village Water Association office.

We routinely monitor for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table below lists all of the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2018. In cases where monitoring wasn't required in 2018, the table reflects the most recent results. As water travels over the surface of land or underground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials and can pick up substances or contaminants from the presence of animals or from human activity; microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm-water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming; pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm-water runoff, and residential uses; organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations and septic systems; radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It's important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk.

In this table you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

- Action Level* - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)* - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)* - The "Goal"(MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL)* - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary to control microbial contaminants.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG)* - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk of health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
- Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l)* - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.
- Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter* - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

As you can see by the tables, our system had no contaminant violations. We're proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some contaminants have been detected however the EPA has determined that your water IS SAFE at these levels.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Our water system is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. Trustees start search for new University of Mississippi head

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — The search is on for a new leader of the University of Mississippi. Trustees on Thursday appointed one of their own to lead the effort, and said they hoped to form up a panel of campus scholars by next week.

Trustee Fred Ford of Oxford will lead the search, with 10 trustees taking part.

The move comes roughly after Jeffrey Vane resigned the post in 1997, and following the death of one of the top job.

From before trustees agreed, the university's interim board was a board of former Higher Education Commissioner Glenn Beale, to meet with interested individuals about what they want in the next Ole Miss leader. Open listening sessions are likely to follow, with trustee President Hal Porter saying the board would like to have a new leader by year's end.

Ole Miss professor slammed on lawsuit quiet before after debate

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Trustees of Mississippi's eight public universities are granting tenure to a University of Mississippi sociology professor who was criticized for encouraging "acts of aggression" against Republican politicians.

Trustees voted Thursday after earlier criticism by Professor James Michael Thomas' move from a letter of 70 former professors of support and disavowal for one authorship in a press release about the move.

Thomas was critical that he was singled out. He says professors shouldn't face workplace consequences for political activities, citing academic freedom guidelines.

In October, as Bruce Kimmrough was confirmed as the U.S. Supreme Court, Thomas owned that professors should continue to express their opinions and choices, saying "they do not deserve your censure."

Then Ole Miss Chairman Jeffrey Vane let Facebook comment "statements that encourage an 'act of aggression'" Republican Gov. Phil

Mississippi governor leads trade trip to Uzbekistan

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Mississippi Republican Gov. Phil Bryant is on a trade mission to the Central Asian nation of Uzbekistan.

Bryant spokesman Debbi Morgan says the governor will depart for Sunday and will return Monday.

The delegation includes Mississippi National Guard Adjutant Gen. Don Breyer, Mississippi Development Authority director Glenn McCallister and others from state government and the private sector.

Morgan tells The Associated Press on Thursday that the Mississippi National Guard and the U.S. military have been working on training for at least a year partnership program.

Morgan says past trade missions by the governor have helped bring jobs to Mississippi.

In February, Mississippi State University established an agreement for research collaboration with Tashkent State Agrarian University in Uzbekistan.

Mississippi man accused in slaying of 75-year-old woman

LEANNON, Miss. (AP) — A United States man is accused in the death of a 75-year-old woman.

Holmes County Sheriff Willie March tells all news outlets that Anthony Fisher is charged with slaying the woman on the driveway of her home.

A police report filed in her hospital on May 15 when she slipped by the top of her head.

March says investigators were tipped to Fisher's involvement in a lawsuit reporting that she was sexually abused by Fisher near his home.

Fisher allegedly was moving a broom with some unknown force against the back of the victim's head and neck, investigators say.

Fisher was arrested Friday on a separate charge of child abuse by neglect.

He remains jailed in Leannon on a \$250,000 bond.

Fisher, 42, has a lawyer.

GTRA gets \$3.3 million for runway work

A \$3.3 million award from the Federal Aviation Administration will help Golden Triangle Regional Airport receive an \$800,000 runway improvement project.

The grant announced Wednesday, in part of \$779,415.549 in FAA grants awarded as part of \$1 billion in supplemental airport infrastructure funds approved last year by Congress.

"It helps us a lot. We'll use some of our regular federal money to supplement this. The whole project will cost about \$4 million," said Airport Director Mike Halsey, who is heading the Mississippi Airport Association conference this week.

The grant is in addition to annual Airport Improvement Program funds GTRA receives each year.

The runway, which now averages 8,000 feet long by 140 feet wide, was last paved in 2006.

The project requires a 100 percent match. The state will provide a portion. The airport will use revenues from a \$4.50 fee levied on each ticket for the other 50 percent.

GTRA is also working with local business and industry groups, with more than 45,000 passengers using the facility last year.

The Lawrence/Walton County Municipal Airport is the only other airport in the state to receive funding, getting \$4,225,000 for design work and runway paving. The airport, which has seen considerable growth in recent years, has had significant drainage issues.

For years ago, part of runway was damaged when part of an airplane hit a wall on end.

The funding will repair those problems and is expected to be done.

under their proposal.

Republican leaders have said the state can't afford such an expansion. Also, Gov. Phil Bryant's administration has pushed the budget to cut much more and has done health benefits.

"We should be seeing an improvement in care and that's not happening," Moore said.

Moore said he proposed a similar plan as Bryant and Medicaid Director Drew Sawyer last year. Moore said he made a second presentation last month and back from Sawyer's office.

Moore said the expansion wants to start conversations during the 2019 election.

"This is a real important part of the state of Mississippi to put our eyes and mind on," Moore said.


