Our water source consists of four wells that draw from the Middle Wilcox Aquifer.

A source water assessment has been completed for the water supply to determine the overall susceptibility of its drinking water to identify potential sources of contamination.. The water supply for NTS Utility Association received three lower and one susceptibility rankings to contamination.

We're pleased to report that our drinking water meets all federal and state requirements.

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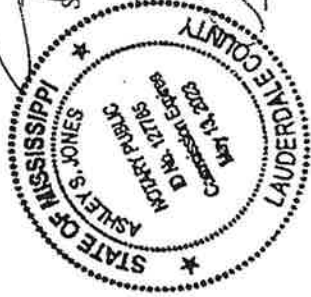
