We're very pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. Our water source is groundwater and our well's draw from the McShand Formation.

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall susceptibility of its drinking water supply to identified potential sources of contamination. The general susceptibility rankings assigned to each well of this system are provided immediately below. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing upon request. All three of our well's all **moderate susceptibility** to contamination

I'm pleased to report that our drinking water meets all federal and state requirements.

If you want to learn more, please attend one of our regular meetings held at 6 P.M on the first Tuesday of each month at the Town Hall.

The **Town of Plantersville** routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2018. As water travels over the land or underground, it can pick up substances or contaminants such as microbes, inorganic and organic chemicals, and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk.

Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum Contaminant Level - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - The "Goal"(MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

*****Additional Information for Lead*****

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The **Town of Plantersville** is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Descendants of asylum patients to share stories at archival event

JACKSON, Miss. — Anyone whose ancestors had links to the old Mississippi State Insane Hospital is invited to a two-day information-sharing event, July 19-20, at the University of Mississippi Medical Center.

"Old Asylum History Days," part of the Asylum Hill Project, is 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day on the first floor of the School of Health Related Professions, located just off Lakeland Drive.

Mississippians and others related to patients or employees of the vanished asylum are asked to record their relatives' stories; attend presentations on the institution's history; learn how to preserve family photos, letters and memorabilia; and avail themselves of free, high-resolution scans of their materials.

Among those who are participating in the Asylum Hill Project are James T. Lee of Owensboro, Kentucky, and his brother Wayne Lee of Durham, North Carolina, whose grandfather, John Benedict Whitfill, left Kentucky to

As UMMC's lead member of the consortium, the Center for Bioethics is working in conjunction with many of Mississippi's universities or colleges, several community partners and two out-of-state universities.

The consortium: UMMC, the University of Mississippi, Millsaps College, Mississippi State University, Jackson State University, University of Southern Mississippi, Texas State University, University of Idaho, Mississippi Department of Archives and History, Mississippi State Hospital and the Mississippi Humanities Council.

Dr. Amy Forbes, Millsaps College associate professor of history, who helped open the door for the grant, said there is a gap in the telling of the asylum's story.

"Descendants can tell us what they know from family lore and what the asylum meant to them; they can help explain the asylum's place in the state's history," said Forbes, who is also assistant director of archival

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Mayor says he'll personally pay for criminals to leave town

CLARKSDALE, Miss. — The mayor of one Mississippi Delta city says he's willing to spend up to \$10,000 of his own money to pay criminals to move out of town.

Clarksdale Mayor Chuck Espy said Monday that if lawbreakers don't think they can turn their life around there, he'll pay for them to move elsewhere.

Espy says that's just part of his plan to cut crime. Clarksdale's 18,000 residents expressed alarm last year after 12 homicides were recorded.

There's been only one homicide so far in 2019. Espy credits improvements to Police Chief Sandra Williams hiring new officers and a new investigator.

Espy says getting criminals to leave town isn't his only gambit. He says he's also focusing on rehabilitation and intervention for those who want to go straight and remain in Clarksdale.

TUPELO POLICE DEPARTMENT

Officers responded to the 700 block of South Glover in reference to a black male wearing black shirt and black shorts that had caused a disturbance at Dollar General with employees earlier this day. Subject fled on foot prior to arrival. For this second call, Officer spoke with an employee and customer at Dollar General who witnessed the suspect, walk across the street and enter Waffle House. Employee and customer both stated the suspect attempted to fight with them before fleeing again. Upon arrival at Waffle House officer saw the suspect seated at a table and arrested him, handcuffed/double locked. The suspect was acting very strange and aggressive after he was handcuffed. Officer knew the suspect to be a crack/cocaine user and his physical symptoms were consistent with recent use. Employees and customers at Waffle House attested to this as well. The suspect was charged with Disturbing a Business (X2), Disturbing the Peace of others, and Public Intoxication. The suspect was transported to the Lee County Jail where he was remanded to jail staff in same condition as found. An 8 hour hold was placed on him for detox. 5-20.

Officer was dispatched to 1001 North Barnes Crossing at Belk to take a report on shoplifting. Officer made contact with one of the managers, who stated that two unknown black females entered the store with an unknown black male and began to take several Polo T-shirts and other articles of clothing. The three suspects tried to leave the store and stole seven different colored Polo T-shirts for a total value of \$342. The manager stated that several ar-

icles of clothing valued at \$821.50 were recovered at the door, but the three suspects did flee the scene with the seven shirts. The manager said that the two females were the ones who actually stole the items, the male with them pointed out the items to steal and drove the vehicle away. She said the vehicle was a white 4 door Dodge Avenger and gave a possible tag # which the officer ran through Lee County 911 and did not get a confirmation on any of the possible tags. 5-20.

Officer observed a green colored Chevrolet truck to have improper equipment (tail light busted) and the driver was not to be wearing a seatbelt on North Glover Street near Barnes Crossing. Contact was made with the driver who identified himself and Lee County dispatch advised the suspect's drivers license were suspended. The suspect was placed in handcuffs (double locked) and transported to Lee County Jail where he was left in good physical condition with the jail staff. 5-21.

Officer was dispatched to Kirkwood Apartments Office in regards to a verbal disturbance. Upon arrival contact was made with the building manager. She stated that the male suspect, one of her tenants came into the office pointing his finger in her face yelling at her about the smell of his neighbor's cat. She said he was wanting out of the lease and called her a b—. She said that it did not get physical between her and the suspect, and that she wanted to file a report. 5-21.

Officer was dispatched to Chateau Royal in regards to an attempted breaking and entering. Dispatch advised the suspect was a black male riding a bicycle. Contact

was made with a subject fitting that description at Stone and West Main. The subject made a quick turn south on Stone Street running into another officer with his bicycle. The subject was identified as told to place his hands on the hood of the patrol car and not to take them off as officer patted him down for weapons for officer safety. The suspect gave officer consent to search. While searching, the suspect continued to remove his hands off the hood of the patrol car, and attempted to face the officer. When attempting to place the suspect in handcuffs for disorderly conduct, he actively pulled away from the officer. The suspect was arrested. The suspect was transported to Lee County Jail where he was charged with disorderly conduct. 5-21.

Officer was dispatched to Scruggs Farm and Garden in response to a petit larceny. Officer arrived at Scruggs and made contact with a cashier and the complainant. She said she noticed a hispanic female and two hispanic males looking at shoes in the shoe department. She was clearing the surrounding area, the hispanic female took the safety tags off a pair of sandals, and stuck them in a backpack that she was wearing on her back. She went to the area that the hispanic female was standing and saw the security sensors inside an empty box. She saw the hispanic female and the two hispanic males leave the store through the center doors, and get into a white Kia Forte with Alabama license plates, and head north on Tom Watson Dr. 5-21.

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
