Horn Lake Water Association is proud to report that our system has not violated a maximum contaminant level or any other water quality standard. Last year, we conducted tests for many contaminants, detecting 17 of these contaminants with none at a level higher than the EPA allows for. This report is a snapshot of our last year's water quality.

Our water source consists of two water plants with five wells pumping from the Sparta aquifer from an average depth of approximately 450 feet. Three of our wells were ranked **LOWER**; two were ranked **MODERATE** in terms of susceptibility to contamination. If you want to learn more, please attend our monthly meetings on the third Thursday of each month and/or our annual meeting, which takes place on the third Thursday in July. 


