
About our flu activity reporting

MSDH relies upon selected sentinel health practitioners across the state to report the percentage of total patient visits consistent with an influenza-like illness (ILI: fever of 100°F or higher AND cough and/or sore throat). Also, providers are supplied with specimen collection kits. Samples are submitted to the Mississippi Public Health Laboratory for influenza PCR testing. Reports are used to estimate the state's ILI rate and the magnitude of the state's influenza activity. Reports represent only the distribution of flu in the state, not an actual count of all flu cases statewide. *Information is provisional only and may change depending on additional reporting from sentinel providers.*

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State ILI Surveillance



During week **46** (11/10/24-11/16/24), the overall state ILI rate (**3.2%**) **remained constant** from the previous week (**2.8%**) and was lower than this time last year (**6.1%**). | Figure 1



During week **46**, four districts (1, 2, 4, and 5) had an increase in ILI activity, while zero districts had a decrease. Five districts (3, 6, 7, 8, and 9) remained about the same. *Information is provisional only and may change depending on additional reporting from sentinel providers.* | **Table 2**




Overall, the percentage of reported ILI cases has been highest among those in the **5-24 years** of age group.
During week **46**, the

percentage


of ILI cases in the 0-4 years of age group decreased. The percentage of ILI cases increased in the 5-24 and 25-49 years of age groups when compared to the previous week, and the 50-64 and 65+ age groups stayed the same. | Figure 2

Syndromic ILI Surveillance

The Mississippi State Department of Health also collects influenza syndromic surveillance data through the CDC BioSense Platform. This data is comprised of chief complaints and diagnosis codes and is submitted electronically by participating hospitals and clinics throughout the state in near real-time. The BioSense data is an additional tool to monitor influenza activity in Mississippi.



The percentage of patients with a chief complaint or diagnosis of influenza-like illness during week **46** increased when compared to the previous week, as well

as the statewide ILI rate. | Figure 4


Influenza Outbreaks

Outbreaks are reportable in Mississippi as a Class 1A event and must be reported by telephone within **24 hours** of first knowledge or suspicion to the Mississippi State Department of Health. For more information on reportable diseases and conditions, please refer to the MSDH List of Reportable Diseases and Conditions.

Between week 40 (ending October 5, 2024) and week 46 (week ending September 16, 2024), five outbreaks were reported to MSDH. MSDH investigates all reported outbreaks, and complete information is available for two of the five outbreaks. Two were attributed to an influenza A virus, unknown subtype, and the other to Rapid A/B.

Through week 46, within the reported outbreaks, the overall vaccination rate among facility residents was 9%, and among staff members, 11%. In addition, the percentage of residents that were ill due to influenza was 11%, and among staff members, 2%. The percentage of residents that were hospitalized due to influenza was 5%, and among staff members, 0%.

Influenza outbreaks have occurred in the following county: Adams (1), Lowndes (1), Pontotoc (1), Rankin (1) | Figure 5

Flu Testing Reports

During week 46 (week ending November 16, 2024), no laboratory confirmed influenza samples were identified by the MSDH Public Health Laboratory.

National and Mississippi Pediatric Mortality Surveillance

Nationally, **two** influenza-associated pediatric deaths occurring in the 2024-2025 season has been reported to CDC. One death was associated with an influenza A virus (not subtyped), one was associated with an influenza A(H3) virus.


Mississippi has had **no** influenza-associated pediatric deaths reported during this influenza season.



National ILI Surveillance

During week **46**, influenza activity **remained stable** in the United States. 2.7% of patients reported through ILINet presented with ILI symptoms. This was comparable to week 45 and was below the national baseline (3.0%).

Region 4's ILI rate (Southeast) **remained stable** when compared to the previous week. Mississippi is included in Region 4. | Figure 6










