

# 2022-2023 Influenza Surveillance Report Week 44

Oct. 30 - Nov. 5, 2022


About our flu activity reporting

MSDH relies upon selected sentinel health practitioners across the state to report the percentage of total patient visits consistent with an influenza-like illness (ILI: fever of 100°F or higher AND cough and/or sore throat). Also, providers are supplied with specimen collection kits. Samples are submitted to the Mississippi Public Health Laboratory for influenza PCR testing. Reports are used to estimate the state's ILI rate and the magnitude of the state's influenza activity. Reports represent only the distribution of flu in the state, not an actual count of all flu cases statewide. *Information is provisional only and may change depending on additional reporting from sentinel providers*.







#### Syndromic ILI Surveillance

The Mississippi State Department of Health also collects influenza syndromic surveillance data through the CDC BioSense Platform. This data is comprised of chief complaints and diagnosis codes and is submitted electronically by participating hospitals and clinics throughout the state in near real-time. The BioSense data is an additional tool to monitor influenza activity in Mississippi.



#### Influenza Outbreaks

Outbreaks are reportable in Mississippi as a Class 1A event and must be reported by telephone within **24 hours** of first knowledge or suspicion to the Mississippi State Department of Health. For more information on reportable diseases and conditions, please refer to the <u>MSDH List of Reportable Diseases and Conditions</u>.

Between week 40 (ending October 8, 2022) and week 44 (week ending November 5, 2022), 11 outbreaks were reported to MSDH. MSDH investigates all reported outbreaks, and of the 11 reported outbreaks, complete information was available for six of them. One (17%) of the outbreaks was attributed to influenza A/H1, four (67%) were attributed to influenza A/H3, and one (17%) was attributed to an influenza A virus, unknown subtype. | Figure 5




The influenza outbreaks have occurred in the following counties: Attala (1), Forrest (3), Franklin (1), Hinds (1), Holmes (1), Lafayette (1), Simpson (1), Walthall (1), and Washington (1).

#### **Flu Testing Reports**

Since week 40 (week ending October 8<sup>th</sup>), **26** laboratory confirmed influenza samples have been identified by the MSDH Public Health Laboratory. Eight (31%) were identified as influenza A/H1 and 18 (69%) were identified as influenza A/H3. | <u>Figure 6</u>



The influenza cases were identified from the following counties: Forrest (7), Franklin (2), Hinds (2), Holmes (3), Lafayette (2), Lincoln (2), Marion (1), Marshall (3), Pontotoc (1), Walthall (1), and Washington (2).

#### National and Mississippi Pediatric Mortality Surveillance

Nationally, **five** influenza-associated pediatric deaths have been reported to CDC for the 2022-2023 season. Three deaths have been associated with an influenza A/H3 virus, while one was associated with an influenza A/H1 virus. The remaining death was associated with an influenza A virus (not subtyped).

Mississippi has had **no** influenza-associated pediatric deaths reported during this influenza season.

#### **National ILI Surveillance**

During week **44**, influenza activity **continued to increase** in the United States. 5.5% of patients reported through ILINet presented with ILI symptoms. This was an increase when compared to week 43 (4.4%) and was above the national baseline (2.5%).


Regions 4 (Southeast) and 6 (South-Central) reported the highest levels of flu activity, followed by regions 3 (Mid-Atlantic) and 9 (south-central West Coast). Mississippi is included in Region 4.


