

Colorectal Cancer in Mississippi 2015-2019

New Cases and Deaths:

- MS ranks 1st in Colorectal Cancer (CRC) mortality in the United States with age adjusted rate of 17.7 per 100,000 US standard population.²
- In 2019, there were more than 1700 new colorectal cancer cases in Mississippi.³
- In 2019, more than 640 people died of colorectal cancer in Mississippi.³
- In 2020, over one-third of Mississippi's adult population (>45yrs) were not screened for CRC.⁴ Incidence and Mortality Rates⁴:





- For every 100,000 people, 50 new cases of Colorectal Cancer were reported (US:38) and 18 (US: 13) died between 2015 and 2019. Mississippi's death (mortality) and new cases (incidence) rates due to Colorectal Cancer are the highest in the United States
- From 2014- 2018, For every 100,000 White males, 54 new cases of Colorectal Cancer were reported, (US:43) and 20 died due to Colorectal Cancer from 2015-2019 (US: 15) making MS White Males 2nd in the nation.
- From 2014- 2018, for every 100,000 Black Males, 73 new cases of Colorectal Cancer were reported, (US: 50) and 28 died due to Colorectal Cancer from 2015- 2019 (US: 22) making MS Black Males 1st in the nation.
- From 2014- 2018, for every 100,000 White Females 40 new cases of Colorectal Cancer were reported, (US: 37) and 17 died due to Colorectal Cancer from 2015-2019 (US: 14).

Risk Factors

•Inflammatory Bowel Disease such as Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis.

- •Family history of colorectal polyps or cancer and genetic factors. •Lack of physical activity.
- •Low intake of fruits and vegetables.
- •Processed meats and low fiber diet.
- •Obesity and overweight.
- •Alcohol consumption.
- •Tobacco use.

Symptoms:

•Stool Tests •Sigmoidoscopy

Screening: (Beginning at age 45)

- •Colonoscopy
- •A change in bowel habits.
- •Blood in or on your stool, weight loss.
- •Diarrhea, constipation, or feeling that bowel does not empty all the way.
 - •Abdominal pain, aches, cramps that don't go away.
